Kramnik Retains Classical World Championship !

Well, it was a nail biter. The challenger, Peter Leko (Hungary) was leading the champion, Vladimir Kramnik (Russia) by 1 point going into game 13 of the 14-game match. Kramnik had to win one of the last two, and draw the other to keep his title. In Game 13, Kramnik pulled out all the stops and it looked for a while like Leko was lost. But he defended accurately, and managed to pull out a draw. He was then ½ point away from the championship. But once again, in the last game, Kramnik pressed hard and eventually penetrated into Leko's position and won the game, keeping his title. He now goes on to play the winner of the January match for the 2005 FIDE World Championship between Rustam Khasimdzhinov (Uzbekistan), 2004 FIDE World Champion, and Garry Kasparov (Russia), 13th World Champion, and the world's highest rated player. This will then finally bring about a reunification of the chess world championship.

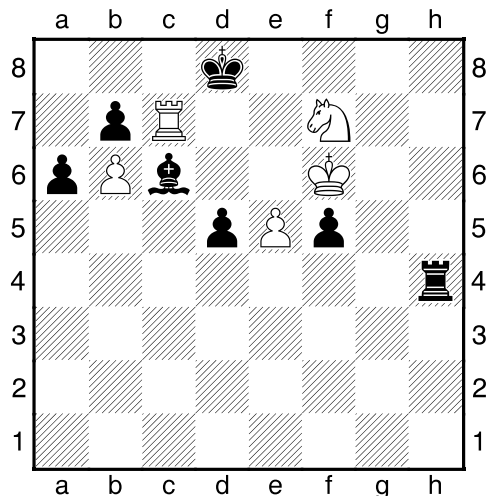

Kramnik Questions Prague Unity Agreement

As was mentioned in the above article, it was agreed that Kramnik would play the winner of the Kasparov-Kasimdzhanov match, to bring about a reunification of the world champion title. But as soon as he had retained his title, Kramnik proposed that it would be better if he played the winner of a tournament involving Kasparov, Kasimdzhanov, Viswanathan Anand (India), the current 2nd highest player on the rating list, and Ruslan Ponomarev (Ukraine), 2002 FIDE World Champion. So far none of the stakeholders has responded to Kramnik’s musings . Though this might be a good idea, we feel that Kramnik is now bound by his agreement under the Prague Unity Agreement, and should not now be raising uncertainty in the whole process.

Canadian National Team Gives Solid Performance at Chess Olympiad

National Team Report

Canada was ranked 43th out of 129 national teams at the start of the Olympiad. We finished with a good 38th place finish !! Our team was without GM Kevin Spraggett, who withdrew for health reasons, and was replaced by IM Yan Teplitsky. GM Alexandre Le Siege also was a no-show, apparently because of passport problems. He was formally replaced by the team captain, IM Brian Hartman, who stated that he would only play if absolutely necessary, and he did not have to play. The other members of the team were GM Dimitri Tyomkin, GM-elect Mark Bluvshstein, and IM Igor Zugic. Here are our results against the teams we played (the # in brackets is the final finish position of the country) :

Ukraine took the gold medal. Russia took the silver, squeaking past Armenia on tie-break, which took the bronze.

On the individual front, GM-elect Mark Bluvshstein had a tremendous tournament, scoring 8.5 / 12 or 70.8%. This put him 4th/5th in the medal standings for 3rd board. Two other members scored over 50% : GM Dimitri Tyomkin – 59.1 %; IM Yan Teplitsky – 59.1 % . IM Pascal Charbonneau, carrying the load of playing first board, scored a creditable 41.7 % . IM Igor Zugic scored 40 % . Congratulations to all the members for their fine effort, and to the captain, Brian Hartman.

Women's Teams Report

The women's team managed to finish # 41 out of 87 teams, better than their original ranking of # 52. Here are their results :

China won the gold medal and USA the silver. Russia squeaked by Georgia on tie-break to take the bronze medal.

On the individual front, our top two boards put in good strong performances, scoring 8.5/12 or 70.8 % : Bd 1 – WIM Nava Starr; Bd 2 – WIM Dinara Khazieva (this score placed her 4th/5th in the standings for second board !). WIM Diane Mongeau and Valentina Goutor each scored 25 %. Congratulations to the captain and all the members for a good performance.

Toronto Thanksgiving Day Open

(report by Larry Bevand, TD)

The Open section was won by Robert Hamilton with an impressive 5.5 points out of 6 which earned him \$250. He drew in round 3 against Ron Livshits and won the rest. IM Ron Livshits was held to a draw in the last round by Shiyam Thavandiran so Livshits finished all alone in 2nd place with 5 points and pocketed \$150. Tied for third place at 3.5 points were the youth brigade of 13 year old Nikolay Noritsyn, 12 year old Shiyam Thavandiran and 13 year old Hazel Smith. The two boys recently became Canadian Masters and the young lady, looks like she will be following in their shoes in the near future. Hazel lost to the top 2 finishers but scored wins against Shiyam and Jura Ochkoos and Arthur Calugar to move her rating up into the 2100 range. The tie was worth \$33.33 each.

Under 2200

Daniela Belc and Victor Krayushkin shared top honours in the under 2200 section with 4.5 points out of 6 and each took home \$137.50 for their efforts. Belc defeated David Southam in the last round while Krayushkin had a marathon affair with Inigo Assaripallam which Krayushkin managed to win in a tricky endgame. Southam finished all alone in 3rd place with 4 points.

Under 2000

The Under 2000 section, with 23 players, was by far the largest section. Once the dust had settled (actually there was no dust in the cafeteria at Hart House...but...it sounds good) Sergiy Orlov of Burlington Ontario finished all alone in first place with 5 points and \$125 in his pocket. Richard Wing needed a win against Athavan Mylvannan to catch up but a draw was consolidated and Richard had to settle for the \$125 2nd place prize with 4.5 points. There was a 5-way tie for 3rd spot at 4 points: Robert Sherman, Omary Shah, Pavel Dimnik, Warren Dutton and Athavan Mylvannan. They each made lunch money of \$10.

Under 1800

An upset in the last round permitted a 3-way tie in this section. Matthew Ramenaden lead the field by a full point going into the last round but his last round opponent, Poya Oftadeh, wasn't impressed. Oftadeh won the game which allowed Jefferey Butt and Matthew Castle to catch up. They scored 4.5 points which was worth \$50 each and thanked Poya profusely (well all except for Matthew) .

Under 1600

Top ranked Conrad Ho was in control throughout allowing 2 draws on his way to capturing this section with 5 points, a full point ahead of the field. The win was worth \$100 and Conrad now moves up to the Under 1800 section for the next event. Jonathan Hyman was held to a draw by Alexandru Florea in the last round allowing a tie for 2nd place at 4 points with Archuthan Mylvannan. They each earned \$25 for their efforts. Mylvannan defeated Paul Buzdon in the last round.

I must admit I enjoyed the experience directing this event. The players were all extremely polite and I think a good time was had by all. There were no disputes, simply on a few occasions, folks wanted a rule clarification. Thanks to everyone who took part!

As I mentioned earlier I got to use a new version of SwissSys which made pairings posting etc a breeze. To think of all the hours I wasted at events years ago writing names, entering results, filling out crosstables etc. Instead, with all this time on my hands....I got a chance to improve my skills at Free Cell on the computer .
