Bluvshstein - 2005 Canadian Chess Player of the Year

Mark Bluvshstein, 17, a Toronto Grade 12 student and chess International Grandmaster, was voted 2005 Canadian Chess Player of the Year. This is the second year in a row Bluvshstein has won the award.

In 2005, Bluvshstein tied for first place at the Canadian Open Chess Championship in Edmonton, Alberta. Bluvshstein also won the Canadian Under-18 Year-Old Chess Championship in Victoria, British Columbia; and finished tied for 3rd place at the World Under-18 Year-Old Chess Championship in Belfort, France.

Chess journalists representing newspapers and chess magazines across the country were asked to vote for the #1, #2 and #3 Canadian Chess Player of the Year for 2005.

Voting method:

1st place vote - 5 points

2nd place vote - 3 points

3rd place vote - 1 point

Chess player accomplishments in 2005:

Mark Bluvshstein - Tied for first place at the Canadian Open Chess Championship; won the Canadian Under-18 Year-Old Chess Championship; and tied for 3rd place at the World Under-18 Year-Old Chess Championship.

Tomas Krnan - Made two qualifying Norms (3rd and final) towards the International Master title.

Nikolay Noritsyn - Made two qualifying Norms towards the International Master title in back-to-back tournaments.

Zhe Quan - Made 3rd and final qualifying Norm towards the International Master title.

Kevin Spraggett (Portugal) - Continued excellent international results, including strong finish at American Continental Championship (0.5 points from advancing to World Cup).

Shiyam Thavandiran (Toronto, Ontario) – Canadian Junior Chess Champion with a score of 8.5/9; at age 12 (Grade 6), the youngest to ever win the title.

Alexander Ugge - Qualified for the Correspondence International Grandmaster title; qualified for the World Correspondence Chess Championship finals.

World Team Championship – Report

This FIDE tournament, held in Israel, was completed on Nov. 10. Nine teams were involved. The suspense went right into the last round. The surprise of the tournament was the China Men's team, who were leading Russia by 2.5 pts. going into the final round. But in the last round, Russia crushed the Chinese Men's team 3.5 - .5, to take the gold medal. Here are the final results :

Nikolay Noritsyn finished on top with 4/5, drawing with Hamilton and Zubac enroute. Hamilton was upset in the 4th round by Hans Jung and thus shared 2nd-3rd with him.

For the second straight tournament, 3rd grader Chris Knox was playing for first place in the final round in the U2000. This time he prevailed against veteran Tim Knechtel to capture clear first with 4/5. His 1900+ performance should hoist his rating over 1700. Tied at 3.5 were Istvan Kiss and Nikita Gusev.

The U1700 finale was also dramatic. 4th grader Cristian Dragan handed Avery Jones his first loss in round 5 to tied with him for first place. Ross Cunningham (gr. 5) took 3rd place with 3.5.

High schooler Volodymyr Vivchariuk won the U1400 with 4.5. Bruce Hurst finished 2nd with 3.5 followed by 2nd grader Steven Leu and grade 10 student Nathan Peeling at 3.0
