## Spraggett Off Form at 5<sup>th</sup> Gib Tel Masters, Gibraltar

GM Kevin Spraggett, highest rated Canadian (reached 2633 in the January FIDE rating list, #80 in the world), and 5 time Canadian Champion, was definitely off form for this tournament that ran from Jan. 23 – Feb. 1 in Gibraltar. He finished a disappointing 42<sup>nd</sup>, with 5.5 pts./9 rounds.

The winner was GM Vladimir Akopian ( Armenia – 2700 ), with 7.5 pts. Tied for  $2^{nd}/4^{th}$  with 7 pts. were GM Alexander Areshchenko ( Ukraine – 2644 ), GM Hikaru Nakamura ( USA – 2651 ) and GM Emil Sutovsky ( Israel – 2629 ).

#### 2007 Canadian Open Update – Early Bird Deadline – Today!

This year's Canadian Open will be in Ottawa from July 7-15 and will be a one-section swiss, with class prizes. If you register today (last day) [go to the CFC website to register online; click on "tournaments"], you get the early bird registration fee of 100, rather than the at-the-gate fee of 150!

This year, one of the so far confirmed foreign GM's is English GM Nigel Short, World Championship Challenger, and current Commonwealth Champion. The organizers expect more to come as the tournament approaches.

#### Guelph Winter Pro – Am – Report

This weekend tournament Feb. 3-4, was dedicated to the memory of recently deceased player, Jan Draak ( I could only get a draw the last time I played him ). Over 100 players turned out. Here is the report of Hal Bond, organizer and TD ( from ChessTalk ):

"Some big results were achieved. Nikolay Noritsyn is back! He scored 5-0 for \$700, defeating Hamilton and Ochkoos who were both on form. Hamilton and Thavandiran each bagged \$300 at 4 points. CFC manager David Gordon was the last player to win. He shared the pennies with Guo, Ochkoos and Bailey.

Konstantin Semianiuk, Mathew Cooke, Simon Gladstne and Danny McGlynn scored 4 atop the U2000. Michael Von Keitz aced the U1700, ahead of Guelph's James (T. Kirk) Scott at 4. Robert Liu defeated Brendan Lee in a playoff after they tied with 4.5 in the U1400. Elliott Kaufman edged out chess dad Dennis Poloniato (who played the event of his life, now that his 3 sons have practically quit) with 4 points. "

#### 2006/7 SCC Club Championship

On Thursday, Jan. 4, the club championship started. The Championship Section is a 10-player round robin, consisting of the top 8 rated players registered, plus the 2 winners of last year's Reserves Section. Playing this year are: Bryan Lamb (2203); Imtiaz Husain (2145); John Hall (2061); Donal Deiseach (2005); Alex Rapoport (1958); Rick Garel (1954); Jim Paterson (1916); Randy Moysoski (1916); Richard Douglas (1760); Doug Gillis (1540). There are 34 players registered for the Reserves Section, which is a 7 round, one-section swiss. The 4 top players in this section are Pino Verde (1867), your intrepid editor, Bob Armstrong (1793), Phil Haley (1786), and Silvano Mesiti (1782).

Leading after 6 rounds is John Hall, with 5 pts. out of 6 rounds. But Bryan Lamb has a theoretical chance of displacing him out of first, since Bryan has 4 pts., but 2 games in hand. In the Reserves, Josh Sherman and Bob Armstrong are tied for  $1^{st}/2^{nd}$  with 5 pts.. There is a 4-way tie for third at 4 pts. : Pino Verde, Silvano Mesiti, Michael Perez and Steve Douglas.


In Rd.5, Bryan Lamb, resident master and highest-rated in the tournament, took sole theoretical possession of first place, with 4 pts, with one game in hand, when he defeated Alex Rapoport in a game that saw Alex sac his Q for R + N, but then succumb. [ John Hall also had 4 pts., but that was in 5 games ]. Here is their game ( Annotations by Bob Armstrong, using Fritz ):


Rd. 5 also saw another wild game in the Championship Section, when Donal Deiseach sacked pieces in a King-side attack against Imtiaz Husain. At the very end, Donal faltered, but then Imtiaz breathed new life into his game, with his own error. But, alas, Donal's flag fell, when he was headed for being up 2 P's in an ending. Here is their game (Annotations by Bob Armstrong, using Fritz):

On Board 1 in the Reserves Section, in Rd. 5, Josh Sherman continued his winning ways (having beaten the first and second highest rated players in the prior two weeks), by defeating Joe Bellomo in an interesting game, where Joe tried to sac his B for what could be 2 connected, passed central pawns, but couldn't get the win. This left Josh in sole possession of first place, undefeated, with 5 pts./5 rounds. Unfortunately there was a time scramble and so there is an insufficient record to reproduce the game.


In Rd. 6, Imtiaz Husain, second highest rated player, defeated Richard Douglas, who had qualified for the Championship Section by winning last year's Reserves Section,

by sacking a B for a K-side attack and then later converting it into an advantage. Here is their game (Annotations by Bob Armstrong, using Fritz):


In the Reserves in Rd. 6, there was an upset on Bd. 1, as Silvano Mesiti (top – rated of those with 3 pts.), defeated the sole leader, Josh Sherman (who was undefeated, with 5 wins/ 5 rounds). This left Josh in a tie for 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup> and Silvano in a 4-way tie for third. Here is their game (Annotations by Bob Armstrong, using Fritz):



On Bd. 2 in the Reserves, the two players tied for 2<sup>nd</sup>/3<sup>rd</sup> battled it out. Your intrepid editor, Bob Armstrong, defeated Pino Verde in a very unorthodox opening, to pull into a first place tie with Josh. Pino was left as part of the 4-way tie for third.
