Topalov Issues Challenge to Kramnik

The FIDE regulations allow a player of 2700 or over (or an ex-World Champion) to request a World Championship match of 12 games on the condition of establishing a prize fund for the champion of \$1 million (USD) and 20% of the prize fund for FIDE. In mid-December, Veselin Topalov (Bulgaria), 2005 FIDE World Champion, issued his formal challenge to Vladimir Kramnik (Russia), 2006 World Champion.

There is a scheduling problem that needs to be overcome, in that the match is to be completed at least 6 months before the 2007 World Championship tournament, in Mexico City, Mexico, which begins Sept. 12, 2007. This means the challenge match would have to be concluded by March 12, 2007. Topalov however has conditionally proposed the match date of April 12 – 30, 2007. He does say however that if FIDE insists on the regulation time-frame, he is willing to have the match occur earlier. Another problem may be that Topalov is slated to play in the Morelia/Linares tournament from Feb. 16 – March 2, 2007. He could not do this and play a world championship match that has to end by March 12, 2007.

We will have to await the response of Kramnik and FIDE to this new development.

Topalov to be Brought Before FIDE Ethics Committee

In a recent public interview, Topalov is alleged to have for the first time himself charged that Kramnik was cheating, using a computer for assistance when he took his washroom breaks. This charge was originally made by Topalov's manager, Silvio Danailov, during the recent World Championship Match. Now Kramnik has had it. His manager, Karsten Hensel, has now advised that a complaint has been formally brought before the FIDE Ethics Committee against Topalov. This could result in a 3-year suspension of Topalov.

The difficulty seems to be that the alleged words were not in the print version of the interview in the Spanish newspaper. They were alleged in the on-line version. Topalov has stated that he did not make any such allegations, and that the newspaper was paraphrasing the earlier words of Danailov, and attributing them to him.

The FIDE chairperson of the Committee has expressed a hope that the two managers can settle this between them, and that the Committee will not be called upon to decide it. But he said they will decide it if they must.

CFC on Very Shaky Ground

Governor's Letter # 3 should give all CFC members cause for great concern. Rumours have been swirling around over the last 6 months indicating various expected weaknesses in the CFC structure. Now there is solid confirmation that the CFC faces serious problems. Here are some selected excerpts from the GL:

"Outgoing President:

<u>CRA:</u> The Canada Revenue Agency conducted an audit ... has recommended the CFC lose its charitable status ...

Budget: The financial picture ... does not look good.

Incoming president:

I don't have much confidence in the CFC financial statements which are included in this letter, but we seem to have a net worth of about \$90,000. We had less than \$10,000.00 in the bank last weekend.

<u>Secretary:</u> We of the CFC are facing a crisis which has the possibility of completely changing our mission and our survival is not completely assured.

<u>Treasurer:</u> The most striking feature is a total collapse of revenues: the projected \$282,581 revenue is to be compared to the 2004 revenue of \$395,544 and to the 2005 revenue of \$404,923.

Our charitable status is in great jeopardy. The CCRA audit claims that we did emit improper tax receipts. Although loss of money could bring us down eventually (there is still over \$100,000 in the foundation), the government can shut down our operations permanently and force us to either give our assets to another registered charity or to the Federal government. "

It is clear that loss of members is a key financial factor for the CFC. This loss of members also affects rating fee revenue, since fewer members leads to fewer players in local tournaments. Unfortunately, we have seen almost no plans from the CFC to meet this problem head on. We are not saying it is an easy, or perhaps an even solvable. problem, but we have seen no creative efforts on this front. It is our belief that one aspect of an attack on this problem involves reversing the decline in membership in over-theboard chess clubs. More local members brings more CFC members, more rating fees as they play in club CFC-rated tournaments, more rating fees as they also play in weekend and national tournaments. It also leads to greater retail sales as active club members purchase books, DVD's, chess sets, and chess gifts for others. It is interesting to note that SCC was suffering like all other chess clubs in Canada back a year or two ago. Our swiss tournament was at one point down to 14 players. The CFC had nothing in place to give any assistance to SCC. And yet our decline was reverberating at the national level, contributing to their decline. Something seems wrong here. The CFC needs to immediately strike a committee to look into this aspect of fighting to recover from our current position..

We would suggest that one thing this committee immediately do is to investigate what suggestions local chess clubs have for CFC support for their operations. And part of this should include an investigation of those chess clubs that are bucking the trend, and increasing their membership despite decline elsewhere. Perhaps the SCC Executive can examine our recent success in turning the club around. We are now getting 44 players out to our swiss tournament, a year or so after our low point. What is SCC doing right? Is it transferable to other chess clubs? Could the CFC Committee act as a bridge to pass such information to other chess clubs? And could the SCC Executive give some suggestions to the CFC Committee as to what kind of support (other than direct \$\$) would be helpful to our continuing to expand our membership? Perhaps the SCC could take the bull by the horns, and raise the issue of striking such a committee with the CFC Executive.

We are not seeing this as a panacea – we recognize it is just one aspect of reversing the decline of the CFC. But it is a start and seems like a critical aspect. One asset the CFC does have is it's current members – YOU! Speak to your local club executive on this idea and bat it around. SCC members - speak to our executive about this idea and pass on any ideas you have to pass on to the CFC. Maybe some kind of grassroots campaign can start a "salvation" plan for the CFC.

Top Ranked Canadian Chess Players at Year-end 2006 (by David Cohen)

GM Kevin Spraggett, originally from Montreal, Quebec, is the top ranked Canadian chess player at year-end of 2006, for the 5th time in a row (2002-6) and for a record 24th time since 1980. Spraggett also obtained the highest ever international chess rating for a Canadian through his play abroad. Canadian Champion IM Igor Zugic, of Toronto, Ontario, was the highest ranked Canadian active in Canada during 2006.

Canadian Women's Champion WIM Natalia Khoudgarian, of Toronto, Ontario, is the top ranked Canadian female chess player at year-end of 2006, for the 11th year in

a row (1996-2006). WFM Valeria Gansvind, of Sidney, British Columbia, was higher ranked (top ranked female resident 2002-5), but represents Estonia internationally. WGM/I Master Sophia Polgar, of Toronto, Ontario, was even higher ranked (top ranked female resident 2006), but was not active; she represents Hungary internationally.

SCC Late Fall Swiss

On Thursday, Nov. 2, a new one-section, 8 round swiss began. 44 players registered (a new record turnout for the last few years). There was a 4-way tie for first, each having 6 pts.: 1st/4th – Bryan Lamb, highest rated player in the club; junior expert Aman Hambleton, 2nd highest-rated player in the club; Donal Deiseach, one of last year's club co-champions, and one of our five experts; and newcomer expert, Josh Guo. In 5th/10th place at 5.5 pts. were: John Hall, one of the five experts in the club; Silvano Mesiti; Josh Sherman; Rick Garel; Randy Moysoski; and Joe Bellomo.

In the final round, on Bd. 1, Guo won a tough game over Hall, with both being in time trouble at the end. Here is their game (Annotations by Bob Armstrong, using Fritz):





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
